





Børge Ousland and Vincent Colliard A new Ice Legacy expedition on Ellesmere Island, Canada



In April 2025, polar explorers Børge Ousland and Vincent Colliard will embark on a new and ambitious expedition on Ellesmere Island, in northern Canada.

Traveling on skis and fully self-supported for two months, they will cover more than 1,100 km through one of the most hostile environments on the planet. This expedition is part of their long-term project: IceLegacy.





Launched in 2014, IceLegacy aims to cross the 20 largest ice caps in the world. More than just a sporting achievement, this project seeks to influence policymakers and public opinion on the vital importance of preserving ice, the climate's sentinel. Through their expeditions, Ousland and Colliard document changes in the ice and raise awareness of the climate emergency.















The Ellesmere expedition will begin at Ward Hunt Island, the northernmost point of Canada accessible from the coast, but the true starting point will be Cape Columbia, the northernmost tip of Ellesmere Island. From there, they will cross three of the largest glaciers in the Northern Hemisphere: the Grant, Agassiz, and Prince of Wales Icecaps. The final destination of the crossing will be King Edward Point, at the southern tip of the island, before ending the journey in Grise Fiord, the northernmost community in the country.







If successful, this will be the first complete crossing of Ellesmere Island without any external resupply — an unprecedented feat on this land with complex climatic conditions.

A word about Ellesmere:

The northernmost island in Canada and one of the largest in the world, Ellesmere is a wild land of mountains, frozen fjords, and ancient ice fields. Once inhabited by Inuit peoples and later explored in the 19th century by European Arctic expeditions, it remains today one of the most remote and pristine places on Earth.
